women requested Elder's aid, following protocol, for a prayer for all people suffering from intergenerational effects, racism, discrimination, murdered and missing indigenous women, for mother earth, and for all those with wounded spirits. A group of organizers danced and presented the Elder's with blankets. Samson Pow Wow goers were asked to join in and dance; dozens rose from their seats to participate in the event, which is the second of four ceremonies. The event was organized by Sandra Peigan and had been rescheduled from it's original planned date of August 4th, 2018 at 4PM.

Walking In Spirit

August 8, 2018—Members of all 4 Nations were invited to participate in a walk and ride event to raise awareness about suicide and loss. The Walking in Spirit event was first organized by Mason Buffalo five years ago after he felt he'd been called back home to Maskwacis when he had been living in Toronto to spread healing in his home community. An elder told Mason, "When you walked in here a spirit walked in right behind you; a young man, about the height of [your] shoulders.

"Instead of turning it into something bad, I turned it into something positive. This spirit is pulling me back here, to Maskwacis." Mason also has a new project in the works: "We're doing a village out at my dad's house where we're planning on having fifteen cabins and bringing people there to have a safe haven.

"They'll be [building] it in the fall." People "aren't walking through this by themselves. There's other people going through the same struggles as them." The walk began at 5 mile for the walkers and at Mostosamy Village for the riders and concluded in Bear Park. ~article and photos by Sara Lee~

ugust 9, 2018— In association with Buffalo Ranch Rodeo, the Native American Food Sovereignty Alliance Initiative, and organized by Paula Johnson, Josh Littlechild led a workshop that covered all aspects of slaughter and traditional harvesting of a buffalo. The hunt began at 5:30 AM. This was in effort to beat the heat of the day. The herd of buffalo were in Bittern Lake area, just west of Camrose, and it took the hunters hours to find and harvest the buffalo. The slaughter was expertly executed by Josh Littlechild, with help from Brian Lee and the participants, including Zak Wuttunee and Josh's own son Connor. The buffalo was skinned quickly with the many men on hand with sharp knives and deft fingers.









The buffalo meat was then loaded up

for quick removal from the heat and was bound for Buffalo Ranch for preparation for a feast of traditional foods. The event was free for the community to attend and took place at the Samson Pow Wow at Bear Park, Maskwacis. Captain George Leonard

Captain George Leonard tells us about a wise service dog named Stinky.

Stinky was one of our first service dogs trained to be a companion for the military soldiers. Her original name was Nikky but she had an unfortunate run-in with two skunks and a pile of manure, so her name was changed to Stinky. It took us a week to get her clean and a month for the stink to go away.

Stinky was in our loaner program. What that means is that when a war veteran was back from the war and having a hard time in life, maybe the soldier would need to have a service dog for up to six months to help him feel better. Perhaps the soldier was home from seeing hard things overseas in the war and we would loan Stinky to the veteran so that he could regain focus and balance in life.

Many veteran soldiers told us stories of how Stinky had helped them out and kept them feeling better. War is hard on soldiers as they may come back sad or angry from what they have seen. They may have been away from their families for a long time. They may not have someone to talk to about what they went through. The loaner dog gives them someone to take care of, to talk to and to be loved by. This is what Stinky was trained to do. She was trained to be there for soldiers who needed to heal from war.

Stinky was there for many soldiers who had seen too much in war. She was a good friend, a good companion, and she even saved some lives in her work. She had a lot of love to give. She was trained to stop actions that could hurt people. She was trained in how to calm people down. She was trained to do certain behaviours until she got someone's full attention. She was honoured by the Purina Hall of Fame in 2011 for saving six lives. She was a dog who had much wisdom. She could sense when someone was sad or when someone was not able to talk to other people. She was wise and knew how to help others.

Sixties Scoop Settlement Information

The approved lawyers are paid by the government separate from the settlement. Koskie Minsky LLP is one of the four firms. They commenced a class action with Wright Oliver & Cooper (Sherwood Park) on behalf of individuals affected by the 60's scoop in Alberta. According to the website both the Federal court and Ontario have both approved a settlement as of today: August 9, 2018. They have authorized a notice to Sixties Scoop survivors.

Key things to know:

- Deadline to submit claim form to Claims Administrator is August 30, 2019
- Deadline to opt out of settlement and not release Canada from a claim is October 31, 2018.
- Settlement includes people who are registered Indians and people eligible to be registered that were removed from their homes in Canada between January 1, 1951 and December 31, 1991 and placed in the care of non-indigenous foster or adoptive parents.
- "[Applicants] do not need to pay a lawyer to complete the form. The administrator will help you fill out the form and there are lawyers [applicants] can speak to free of charge".
- Papers are not needed from relevant child service agencies to apply.
- Claim forms are available at sixtiesscoopsettlement.info or 1-(844)- 287 4270.


