On September 28th Ermineskin held its official Orange Shirt Day Event. The event started by giving everyone their orange shirts and asking those who were willing to participate to write the names of someone effected by the terrible conditions of the residential schools on a piece of paper shaped like an orange shirt. There were a large number of participants from all age groups and quite a few volunteers who assisted with distributing the shirts and coordinated the event. After everyone had their shirts, everyone began walking a short distance to the residential school memorial stone located in front of the Ermineskin High school. It was here that stories and testimonies regarding the residential schools were told by guest speakers as well as the importance of healing, moving forward and how to begin your own healing journey. A small lunch was then given out as the event came to a close. We would like to extend our gratitude to the RCMP, drum group, guest speakers, and volunteers who made this event happen and we hope to see such a large turnout next year.

The Growing Recognition of Orange Shirt Day

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation (named in 2021), also known as Orange Shirt Day, is a day that recognizes the heartbreaking history of Canadian Residential Schools, the missing children, the families left behind, and of course the survivors of these institutions. It has been a year since the child remains at the former Kamloops Indian Residential School have been found, and the search of many other former residential schools began. This has had major impacts across Canada, and continue to effect us today. This day continues to grow across the county, with more participants and support from Canadians as a whole. Awareness grew so much we even had a highly controversial visit and apology

from the pope. On September 30th, every year, we come together for the survivors, the ones who didn't come home, and the many families who have experienced heartbreak from the lasting trauma from these residential schools. Those who spoke at the event showed extreme courage sharing their stories with the public. We appreciate those who came to the event, walked with us, showed support, as well as grieved and healed with one another. This day is not easy, but it is important, not only to First Nations people, but to all Canadians and those across Turtle Island. We hope that this day continues to shed a light on the history of First Nations Peoples, and educate future generations.

They trusted me to lead them again for a second term and I appreciate that. As this new year comes Id like to move and protect all of us because of the things that are changing right now in the world. Id like to thank my wife and kids for keeping me going through my past 3 years on council. Id also like to say thank you to everybody the elders. Hai Hai."

We closed with a statement from Ryan Ermineskin- "Id like to thank those of you who have lent us your support and who have come with us on this journey. I greatly look forward to working with the newly elected councilors. I've had many teachers id like to thank, one of which was my dad among many others. They've helped me see this through and fight for our rights and the things we all believe in. I look forward to this journey and id like to thank all of you for coming along, Hai Hai."
