Bones of Crows Screened Locally

On Friday, April 14, 2023 Ermineskin Cree Nation Events Department hosted the movie: **BONES OF CROWS** is told through the perspective of Cree Matriarch Aline Spears as she survives a childhood in Canada's residential school system to continue her family's generational fight in the face of systemic starvation, racism, and sexual abuse that took place in the residential school system. Aline Spears uses her uncanny ability to understand and

He asked kikawinaw-askiy, our mother earth, if she would be willing. She agreed, but stated that she couldn't do it alone. She called upon piyesiw, the thunderbird, who arrived in the form of a translucent light blue creature soaring through the sky. She exhaled yotin, giving rise to the wind. The sun was already here.

Years ago, during a sweat ceremony, the grandfathers revealed to us what the future held. They told us that our mother earth was hurting and that she would begin healing herself. The grandfathers of wind, fire, and the thunderbird declared they would stand support What people refer to as "natural disasters" are simply our mothearth When planning a special day for a ceremony, you can pray to our father first and ask our mother earth, the wind, the thunderbird, and the sun to bless the day. You should raise a pipe four days in advance and their songs. If you do not possess a pipe or know the songs, seek someone who does. It is not our way to proceed alone without the proper knowledge or tools.

"I hope to offer education, storytelling, and authenticity," says Roan. "It's important to take up space authentically in fashion, especially since a lot of non-Indigenous folks tend to appropriate our designs and artwork. I hope to bring recognition of my tribal and family designs in fashion, to educate through storytelling, and to let the people know that we are still here and

shares her experiences growing up in Pigeon Lake and how her connection to her culture and heritage has shaped her worldview which bled through into her designs.

Osa has had the amazing opportunity

to have supermodel Quannah Chasing horse and *Prey* star Amber Midthunder, model pieces in her collection at the Vancouver Indigenous Fashion Week. Her art is also a celebration of Indigenous culture and a way to honor the traditions of her ancestors. "I got into design through generational teachings that were passed

down to me," Roan told *Vogue*.

"I was taught how to design and do beadwork by my mother, Bear Roan, and great grandmother, Sarah Meguinis, at the age of seven."

The feature in Vogue Magazine is a well-deserved recognition of Osamuskwasis's talent and the important work she is doing. We hope that as time goes

on more and more indigenous artists and designers can get the recognition they deserve for their work as well.

Ermineskin Official App has been Released!



Chief Travels to Coronation

The Chief of Ermineskin Cree Nation, one of the Four Nations of Maskwacis, Chief Randy Ermineskin, was among the representatives from Treaty 6 Territory at the coronation of King Charles III on May 6, 2023.

Chief's from across Treaty 6 land attended the coronation of His Majesty, as well as Her Majesty the Queen, in Consort London, England to honour their Treaty relationship.

The other two Treaty 6 Chiefs to attend were Chief Trevor John and Chief Tony Alexis.

"The Confederacy of Treaty No. 6 First Nations congratulates His Majesty King Charles III on his Royal Coronation," said Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation Chief Alexis in a press release.

"We look forward to working with King Charles III in ensuring the Crown's responsibility to Treaty 6 are upheld.

"The Confederacy of Treaty No. 6 First Nations expects King Charles III to commit to visiting Treaty 6 Territory to foster friendship and cooperation and to address unfulfilled Treaty obligations."

Maskwacis Area Fire Ban

As the warm and sunny days of summer approach we should take time to remember the importance of maintaining safety and preserving our natural surroundings. In light of these priorities, the Ponoka, Maskwacis, and Wetaskiwin area fire ban has been implemented. This article aims to shed light on the reasons behind the fire ban, its significance, and what residents should be mindful of during this period. The imposition of the fire ban stems from the need to prevent the occurrence and spread of wild-fires.

Wildfires pose significant risks to both human life and the environment, and their potential for destruction cannot be underestimated. By implementing a fire ban, we aim to minimize the chances of accidental fires and protect the safety and well-being of its residents. Maskwacis and its surrounding area is blessed with an abundance of ecosystems that provide habitats for various wildlife species. The fire ban acts as a precautionary measure to safeguard our environment from the devastating consequences of wildfires. It helps prevent the loss of vegetation, loss medicines such as sweetgrass or sage, destruction of animal habitats, and potential long-term damage to our ecosystem.

During the fire ban, it is crucial to be aware of activities that are strictly prohibited. These activities typically include open fires, throwing cigarette butts out of vehicles, campfires, and the use of fireworks or firecrackers. It is important to respect these restrictions to prevent accidental fire ignition. While



the fire ban restricts open fires, it does not necessarily mean you have to forgo outdoor cooking altogether. Gas or propane barbecues can still be used, but caution must be exercised. Ensure proper maintenance, keep a close eye on the barbecue while in use, and have a fire extinguisher nearby. It is also essential to place the barbecue on non-combustible surfaces and away from any flammable materials. Stay vigilant and report any signs of smoke or fire immediately to the local authorities.

Prompt reporting can make a significant difference in preventing small fires from escalating into major incidents. The faster the response, the better chance we have of minimizing the impact on our community. By respecting and adhering to the fire ban regulations, we can collectively reduce the risk of wildfires and ensure the safety and well-being of our fellow residents. Stay informed and exercise caution.

CHIEFS RANDY SPEAKS ON UPCOMING EVENTS

Over the past month, Chief Randy Ermineskin has released a few statements on ongoing and upcoming events within the nation. The first statement he made was released on May 4th, 2023.



To start things off he spoke on the warmer and dryer weather and how that resulted in the current fire ban we're experiencing. He also spoke at length about Red Dress Day and the importance of raising awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls, and Two-Spirit people. Importantly, he mentioned the end of month Annual Powwow that would be taking place on the 26th to 28th of this month and the excitement felt throughout the community as the date approaches. Lastly in his first statement he spoke on the approaching graduation ceremonies and the importance of celebrating their success.

A week later in light of even more impending large events the chief released another statement speaking on mothers day and the N.R.T.A. summit at the end of the month. In regards to Mothers Day Chief Randy expressed the im-

portance of honoring our mothers for the work that they've done to bring us into this world, support, spiritual advice, amongst many other ways that they enrich our lives. With the National Resource Transfer Agreement or N.R.T.A. summit happening at the end of the month he praised the efforts of the people within the external affairs department and any others who are assisting to realize this monumental event. The event itself will feature several key speakers such as Sylvia McAdamns and Sharon Venne who will be presenting on topics such as traditional perspective and History of First Nations and Crown Relations. The summit is largely focussed on reforming the act below.



The Alberta Natural Resources Act

Assented to April 3, 1930, Chapter 21, Alberta

An Act Respecting the Transfer of the Natural Resources of Alberta

Also referred to as the Natural Resources Transfer Agreement (N.R.T.A.)

And confirmed as Schedule (2) Alberta, Memorandum of Agreement made this fourteenth day of December, 1929, between The Government of the Dominion of Canada and The Government of the Province of Alberta in the Constitution Act, 1938 [20-21 George V, c. 26 (U.K.), given effect on 10th July 1930]. An Act to confirm and give effect to certain agreements entered into between the Government of the Dominion of Canada and the Governments of the Provinces of Manitoba, British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan respectively.

Commentary

- As set out in section 10 of the NRTA, Alberta is obligated to transfer unoccupied Crown lands back to the federal government so that Canada can fulfil its obligations under the treaties with First Nations.
- Since 1986, Alberta has settled 11 different land claims, contributed 178,281 acres of unoccupied Crown land to Canada in trust for First Nations and also \$57.6 million in compensation.
- Section 12 of the NRTA limits
 Alberta's right to make laws
 applicable to First Nations concerning
 hunting, trapping and fishing. In
 Alberta, Indians are guaranteed the
 right to take game and fish for food—
 an important limitation—during all
 seasons of the year on unoccupied
 Crown lands and on any other lands to
 which Indians have a right of access.
- Under the NRTA, the Government of Canada agrees that provincial laws respecting game shall apply to the Indians within provincial boundaries in order to secure the continuance of the supply of game and fish for the support and subsistence of Indians.
- The term "Indians" contained in the NRTA has been interpreted by the Alberta Court of Queen's Bench in the Ferguson case (1994) to include nontreaty Indians and even Metis, with respect to harvesting rights so long as that person is of "Indian blood" and following "an Indian mode of life". However, in the Blais case (2003) the Supreme Court of Canada held that Metis are not Indian for the purpose of the NRTA.
