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WESTERN TREATIES N.R.T.A SUMMIT 2023



This year Ermineskin Cree Nation and the Western Treaty Nations hosted the 2023 Natural Resource Transfer Agreement Summit at Maskwacis Bear Park. This 4-day event started Monday May 29, 2023 and concluded June 1, 2023. The N.R.T.A. is a set of agreements between Canada and the provinces Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. It was intended to create equality between the prairie provinces and the other Canadian provinces by giving them control over their lands and natural resources. The N.R.T.A. was signed by the Federal Government and the provinces in 1930 and gave control of natural resources to the prairie provinces. That year, the N.R.T.A shifted federal administrative duties of natural resources to the

three Prairie Provinces, creating a conflict with the inherent rights and jurisdiction of the First Nations treaty rights holders that are located within these provinces. Moving forward as First Nations peoples, the expectation of the event is to educate and inspire nations across Canada to inquire a deeper level of understanding the inherent treaty rights. We also hope to eventually engage the Canadian Governments in meaningful dialog and fair negotiations. Furthermore, to re-establish our jurisdiction and authority over the lands, water, wildlife and natural resources within the western provincial regions.

The summit included attendees and leadership from all across the western provinces cont'd..

such as Alberta, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba. In fact, many leaderships such as Leonard Standingontheroad- Grand Chief Treaty Six Nations, Arthur Noskey--Grand Chief of Treaty Eight First Nation, Roseanne Archibald- National Chief Assembly of First Nations, Cathy Merrick- Grand Chief of Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs, and many more honored guests. Not only did leadership attend, but also our elders and knowledge keepers. Many guest speakers that communicated on multiple topics and events leading up to the N.RT.A. Summit. Speakers such as Sharon Venne, Sylvia McAdam, Russel Diabo, Heather Bear, Paul Chartrand and countless others.

Sylivia McAdam giving her statement on the Traditional Perspective states, "What does systemic mean; after the treaty making and how we got to this point, it's called Underlying The Crown. It is the Doctrine of Discovery- the language of domination and dehumanization; the language used to separate indigenous peoples from the land. Criminalizing the people who are trying to protect the land and water. Some of the medicine we were able to access on our hunting grounds, we can't find. We have to take a stand somewhere, the federal government cannot continue to do this and we cannot continue to let them."

Heather Bear, Fourth Vice Chief of F.S.I.N. (Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nation) continues with similar thoughts, expressing her concerns on the lack of consultation with First Nation peoples and the environmental impacts of the increased mining area within her nation. "These impacts will result in chronic

waste disease and allow for more health concerns to be developed," she says. Mrs. Bear believes that shaming the Canadian government on a global scale will assist and bring attention to these issues and that unity is key to making progress.

Paul Chartand- former lawyer and professor,, goes on to point out that the N.R.T.A have been made part of the constitution and as a result will be much harder to change. Mr. Chartrand disputes that the specific section of the constitution that applies to the N.R.T.A. has been misinterpreted; in a way that disfavours first nations peoples. It highlights the lack of consent to the current constitution. Thus, drawing attention to government overreach and lack of accountability.

We expect to see change in the near future in regards to the N.R.T.A. and the neglect First Nations peoples have faced when it comes to our inherent treaty rights. With this summit coming to an end, it is hoped that the information, resources and shared knowledge will encourage our people to be involved with treaties, their history and the impact they have on our current way of life. Our elders tell us time and time again, that they want to see our nations thrive, and that it is up to us to teach and protect our future generations. It is up to us to share their teachings and their knowledge that they have given us, and continue to support one another.



WOMENS LAND BASE TEACHING

During the week of May 23-25, 2023, The Brighter Futures Department hosted another successful Women's Land Based Teaching workshop that was facilitated by Elders, Lorraine Cutarm & Effie Janvier. This workshop took place at the Village Inn at Pigeon Lake, Alberta and consisted of 15 participants.



Lorraine explained, "This workshop is a reminder of our responsibilities as mothers, grandmothers, and great grandmothers. The past two years have had a huge impact on our lives that we are still living through today. The isolation itself has affected our families and friends throughout our community. Land based learning is going to be different for everyone, but it's up to the participants on how they retain and utilize the knowledge and skills we are teaching. We are here to break those barriers that keep us in place where complacency is the norm. Each and every one of us have the capacity to lead our loved ones to wellness, no matter what it takes to get there."

Throughout the three-day workshop, the women that attended had the experience of learning cultural traditions and obtain the knowledge/importance of ceremonies; knowledge that some of our women did not get the chance to learn growing up. Lorraine and Effie taught these women the importance of protocol and how it plays a role in our daily lives. As well, the importance of knowing and sharing family history with your families and friends.

Another key lesson that the facilitators wanted

to emphasize is wellness. Wellness for our physical,




psychological, spiritual and mental state as women. Indigenous women face 80% more physical/mental struggles than the average man. This was a very big topic that they wanted to teach to those who attended. These women learned wellness through activities such as morning and evening nature walks, out-of-the-box gardening, sewing, massage/reiki and open discussions on issues & solutions indigenous women face on a daily basis.

As a result, the three-day workshop allowed these women to ground themselves with ceremonial teachings, elder guidance and fun activities. Lorraine will be facilitating similar workshops in the near future with the partnership with the Brighter Futures Department.
