### EARLY YEARS CULTURAL TEACHINGS & REGALIA MAKING

With powwow season upon us, Early Years has provided some programs to be tiny tot ready! Over the month of May, they invited those in the program (new and expecting parents) to create outfits and other regalia items. Participants made outfits with Donna Rain, some using a sewing machine for the first time! Mothers created grass outfits, a jingle dress, and an infant T-Dress! They also had hair drop making with Ivan Roan, and another session was parfleche hair tie making with Courtney L. Yellowbird, where she taught participants how to cut, hole-punch, paint and add felt edging with lace to their designs. "I think this is very exciting because I am also just learning how to work with parfleche, so I'm happy we can do something like this together, and kind of learn from one another in such a close setting," she says.



Marleigh Cutarm, client of the MHS Early Years program adds, "I am happy to be able to participate in these kinds of teaching. I don't really have anyone to educate me when it comes to the powwow circle, or what goes into making an outfit and all of the accessories. I know that some parents, including myself, cannot afford to buy outfits. I wanted to see if I could teach myself and learn from someone, that way I can make future outfits as my daughter grows. She gets to wear her dress at the ECN 2024 Powwow!" She also adds, "I am thankful that Early Years provides so many programs and services to new and expecting parents of all Four Nations! As a new parent, they supported me and helped me navigate parenthood one step at a time, celebrating so many milestones with my little family, and I am just so appreciative."

"These sessions are important because the teachings are being passed down to the parents and child (extended family & friends). My favorite part is watching the parents/kids connecting with each other and learning from all the different elders from the 4 Nations. We here at Early Years would like the participants to learn one of our tool box card and a cultural teaching /story and or even connection and with other community members/elders" says Ashley Giroux, one of the many dedicated visitors at MHS Early Years.

## INDIGENOUS HISTORY MONTH

On September 25, 1877, Chief Bobtail (Kiskayo) signed Treaty 6 with the Governor of the North West Territories, which gave the four Cree Bands (432 Indians) a reservation which ran from the ridge of Bear Hills southeast to the Battle River, and would be the humble beginnings of the Hobbema Reserve. The four original chiefs of what is now Maskwacis were Bobtail, Ermineskin. Muddy Bull and Samson, and during 1884-85, the joint boundaries of the Ermineskin, Bobtail, Montana, Samson bands were established within the thousands of acres of reserve land. During the early days, the reserve schools were run by missionaries, then in 1929, the Hobbema School District No. 4445 was officially formed.

Over the years, the native families of Maskwacis became good friends and neighbors to the people of Ponoka and surrounding districts. Early photos in our history books show the Battle River Valley east of town full of teepees, horses and wagons on many occasions when the native tribes visited Ponoka to trade and barter for goods, as well as performing their colorful and traditional dances of the buffalo hunting era in front of Alger's Store on Railway Street, as well as at the annual Ponoka Stampede. Many members of the Maskwacis tribes had become successful farmers and trappers, as well as working for the agency or throughout the reserves, which were complemented quickly by modern homes, churches, schools, businesses, recreation facilities and countless other amenities.

# PRODE MONTH

Pride Month is a time dedicated to celebrating and supporting the LGBTQIA2S+ community. It typically takes place in June each year, with various events, parades, and activities organized worldwide to promote equality, visibility, and acceptance for LGBTQ+ individuals. The month also commemorates the Stonewall Riots of June 1969, which marked a turning point for the LGBTQIA2S+ rights movement in the United States. Pride Month serves as an opportunity for people to honor the history, progress, and ongoing struggles of the LGBTQIA2S+ community while fostering a sense of belonging and solidarity.

The acronym LGBTQIA2S+ stands for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, Asexual, Two-Spirit, and the "+" represents other sexual orientations, gender identities, and expressions that may not be explicitly included in the initial acronym. This inclusive term acknowledges the diversity within the LGBTQ+ community and affirms the identities and experiences of individuals who may not fit into traditional understandings of sexual orientation or gender identity. It reflects the ongoing evolution and expansion of language and understanding regarding gender and sexual diversity.

In many First Nations communities, there is a growing recognition of and support for LGBTQIA2S+ individuals, although attitudes and acceptance may vary depending on cultural, historical, and individual factors. Traditionally, many Indigenous cultures had concepts and roles that encompassed a diverse range of gender identities and sexual orientations, often with respect and reverence. However, colonization, Christianization, and the imposition of Western norms have led to the marginalization and erasure of

these identities and roles within some Indigenous communities.

Today, many Indigenous activists and leaders are working to reclaim and revitalize these traditional understandings of gender and sexuality, promoting acceptance and inclusion within their communities. There are also initiatives and organizations focused specifically on supporting LGBTQIA2S+ Indigenous peoples, addressing issues such as discrimination, violence, and access to culturally competent healthcare and social services.

Efforts to foster inclusion often involve cultural revitalization, education, and community engagement, emphasizing the importance of respecting and honoring diverse identities and experiences. By centering Indigenous perspectives and values, these efforts aim to create safer and more affirming spaces for LGBTQIA2S+ individuals within First Nations communities while challenging colonial and heteronormative norms.




