On August 27, 2025, members of our Nation had the important opportunity to participate in the democratic process by casting their votes for the upcoming four (4) council positions. Polling stations were open from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the N.O.K. Building, allowing community members to have their voices heard and help shape the leadership of our Nation for the next term.

This year's election saw a strong turnout and a diverse field of fourteen candidates nominated for these four available positions. After all ballots were counted, the results of the 2025 Council Election are as follows:

- Cory Littlechild 337 votes
- Craig Makinaw 285 votes
- Tamara Wildcat 280 votes
- Arlene J. Littlechild 279 votes

We extend our heartfelt congratulations to the newly elected councillors. Each will serve a threeyear term beginning in October 2025. We look forward to their leadership and dedication to the continued growth and well-being of our Nation.

CELEBRATING U OF A ALUMNI; *PATRICIA* GOODWILL- LITTLECHILD

The Distinguished Alumni Award recognizes alumni who have achieved exceptional accomplishments over a lifetime, earning national or international acclaim, or making a profound and lasting impact within their communities.



Patricia I. Goodwill-Littlechild, '95 BEd

Patricia Goodwill-Littlechild is an educator, Elder and cultural protector whose impact on Indigenous education and language revitalization is felt in her home community of Maskwacis, Alta., and around the world. Over her 30-year career as a teacher, principal and administrator, Goodwill-Littlechild advanced education to build a healthy, vibrant community. As president of Maskwacis Cultural College from 2007-17, she brought in culturally grounded policies and expanded degree opportunities for students. Her efforts led to the community's historic 2016 adoption of Nêhiyawêwin (Plains Cree) as the official language of Maskwacis, a landmark step that helped catalyze the United Nations' 2019 Year of Indigenous Languages. She has been a member of numerous boards and committees and an adviser to all levels of government, always working to champion Indigenous self-governance, culturally responsive education and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action. A member of the Ermineskin Cree Nation and enrolled member of the Lakota Nation in South Dakota, Goodwill-Littlechild was honoured in 2024 with two lifetime achievement awards - from the Esquao Institute for the Advancement of Aboriginal Women and the Ermineskin Education Trust Fund that recognized her enduring impact as an educator, wisdom keeper and "angel among us." She also holds a MA from Gonzaga University. Now retired, she continues to mentor students, study Indigenous languages and contribute to reconciliation efforts.

Treaty 1-11 Gathering — August 18-22, 2025 Hosted by Tsuut'ina Nation (Tsuu T'ina)



A Gathering of Unity: "We Are of One Mind"

From August 18 to 22, 2025, hundreds of Elders, knowledge keepers, leaders, youth, and community members representing Treaties 1 through 11 convened on Tsuut'ina Nation. The multiday gathering brought together voices from across Canada in a powerful testament to treaty solidarity and renewal.

Centered on the theme "We Are of One Mind", the Summit sought to breathe new life into the spirit and intent of the treaties, bridging past, present, and future in shared purpose and mutual recognition.

What Took Place: Ceremony, Dialogue, Celebration **Daily Pipe Ceremonies & Grand Entry**Each morning began with traditional pipe ceremonies at 7 AM, grounding the gathering in ancestral ways. Grand entries underscored unity and respect among participating Nations.

Five Pillars for the Future The agenda structured discussions around five foundational pillars of treaty life:

- **Treaty with Creator:** Operationalizing treaties in line with true spirit and intent.
- **History of Treaties 1–11:** Acting on collective memory and treaty teachings.
- **Nationhood:** Rebuilding sovereign governance and identity.
- **Fiscal Responsibility:** Delivering treaty benefits and economic stewardship.



• **Citizenship & Jurisdiction:** Strengthening legal and civic frameworks.

Participants joined Elder-led dialogue sessions, youth luncheons, and leadership forums to contribute their perspectives and wisdom.



Closing Ceremony & Cultural Highlights
On August 22, the gathering closed with a powerful ceremony featuring the Transfer of Treaties 1–11 Bundle, symbolic flag retirements, a communal dinner, and entertainment—highlighted by a Round Dance that invited all to join in celebration.

Voices from the Gathering

Representatives stressed the living essence of the treaties. Margo Auger of the Big Stone Cree Nation (Treaty 8) captured the sentiment beautifully:

"Treaties are not a part of history, but rather a part of the present and future – a way of living together."

A Shared Legacy, A Renewed Path

Gatherings like this reaffirm that treaties are not static relics—they are living relationships calling for continued respect, dialogue, and action. With the collaborative spirit of the five pillars and renewed leadership engagement, the Treaty 1–11 Gathering charted a course forward rooted in Indigenous sovereignty, accountability, and kinship.

Youth as Future Leaders

Perhaps most impactful was the consistent recognition from Chiefs and leaders across the Treaties that youth are not just "leaders of tomorrow," but active contributors today. Their input on the **Five Pillars of Treaty Life**—especially on Nationhood and Citizenship—was woven into the collective outcomes of the gathering.

As one young delegate from Treaty 7 expressed: "Our voices matter because we are living the future of these treaties. If we don't step up now, the promises and teachings could be lost. But if we walk together, we carry them forward."

Plans Going Forward

Building on the theme "We Are of One Mind," the Treaty 1–11 Gathering closed with a shared commitment to concrete next steps. Among the priorities identified:

- Youth Leadership Development create mentorship and training opportunities to prepare youth to take on roles in governance, cultural preservation, and nation-building.
- Treaty Education expand initiatives in schools and communities to teach the true history and living meaning of Treaties 1—11.
- Language and Culture Revitalization support immersion programs, land-based learning, and intergenerational knowledge transfer.
- Nation-to-Nation Dialogue strengthen cooperation among the Treaty Nations through annual gatherings, working groups, and joint advocacy.
- Economic Sustainability explore collective approaches to fiscal responsibility and economic development rooted in treaty rights.
- **Governance and Sovereignty** advance discussions on self-determination, jurisdiction, and citizenship frameworks.
- Quarterly Accountability reconvene annually to review progress on the Five Pillars and report back to communities.

ATTENTION!

Ermineskin Emergency Services is working with Indigenous Service Canada for those who were impacted or experienced loss by WILDFIRE in April 2025.

There is funding available for those who have experienced loss. Examples would be as follows:

- 1. Total loss house fire. These applications do not just apply to the head of the household, but also sub family units.
- 2. Smoke damaged property, should a household have been impacted by smoke damage if any of their soft furnishings (couch, clothing, mattress, linens, curtains etc) been damaged due to extensive smoke damage, these items can be claimed as well.
- 3. Due to power outage and being away from the home during evacuation, if any community members realized a loss of food, fridge, freezer etc. they can claim for the appliances and the loss of food (loss of food is an allowance).
